Not surprisingly, citizens eager to know the truth, and to make intelligent choices, within this dangerous social milieu, are hyper sensitized to what they hear as threatening or destabilizing. In the contest of rival inner mythologies, there is ample room for paranoia to create fresh devils and demons and to lay claim to conspiracy theories, which acquire a plausibility to which in a less fraught social era they would never have been able to lay claim.

Paranoia can of course thrive in the unsure milieu of a great state, but is equally potent on the micro level. Jimmy is hoping to make the call for quarterback in the big game. On his way to the locker room he spots Butch, his rival, talking in a low tone with coach. He knows, he just knows, they are talking about the Syracuse game, and the secret line up that will leave him out in the cold.
